Dues Increase

The Lodge Executive Committee, in preparing the lodge budget of 2011 has determined that an increase in dues is necessary. Therefore the next round of dues notices (which will be in this issue of the Nendawen) will be for \$20.00. The Lodge year begins on January 1st and runs through December 31st.

As a result of this increase, the fee for Life Membership in Klahican Lodge will increase from \$150 to \$200, effective January 1st. Any current member who is at least Brotherhood may become a Life Member. The fee includes two Life flaps, a laminated Life Membership card and the right to purchase an additional Life flap every year. Between now and December 31st, the fee is \$150.00.

Lodge Treasurer & Advisor


One of the responsibilities of the Lodge Treasurer and the Lodge Financial Advisor is to account for the income and expense of the Lodge, prepare financial statements, develop the annual budget, and to monitor income and expenses in comparison to the budget.

Under the OA guidelines, all funds are maintained by the local council office.

The Lodge Treasurer and Lodge Financial Advisor reviews the monthly financial records.

We have presented below a summary of activity through August 31, 2010. Note that this is prior to the Fall Fellowship, which is the largest income function for the year.

The Communication Challenge

66 Communication is frequently blamed for causing countless organizational problems. Therefore, it is one of the most valuable skills a leader can possess. One of the more important types of communication is one-on-one interaction. Research shows that personally connecting with someone demonstrates that you care and enhances your ability to communicate effectively. Here are some steps you can take to improve your communication skills. Before communicating, ask yourself the following questions: "Is the statement true?" "Is the statement necessary?" "Is the statement kind?" If the answer to any of these questions is no, reconsider what you are going to say. Keep in mind that communication is not only about what you say, but also about how your audience will hear, interpret and understand you. Second, give your full attention to your audience. Avoid wandering from your purpose by becoming distracted from the topic at hand. Be open with people and actively involve them in your conversations so that they do not tune out. Third, be passionate but respect the values and beliefs of your audience. It is OK to express your own opinion, but be sure to equally solicit the opinions of others. Personal communication does not involve talking to another but rather talking with that person. There are many tools at our disposal to help us communicate. The key is knowing how to use these tools effectively to our advantage. Making people feel more involved can only improve our effectiveness. Meeting the communication challenge is vital to providing for the needs of those vou serve and lead.

BROTHERHOOD MEMBERSHIP* From the beginning of the Order in 1915, all members have been equal. There are no ranks. An Ordeal member is entitled to all the rights and privileges of membership in the Order. Yet, so important is the induction sequence that the Order strengthened it by creating Brotherhood membership. It is an opportunity for members to evaluate their past service to Scouting and to the lodge since their Ordeal induction. Brotherhood membership is sought by Arrowmen seeking to reaffirm their belief in the high purposes of the Order. Before becoming a Brotherhood member, each Arrowman makes a special effort to serve his troop and to learn about the Order. Each Brotherhood member commits himself to even more service to Scouting through the Order. . . . Brotherhood membership marks the completion of your induction into the Order of the Arrow. After at least 10 months of active service, you are eligible to seal your membership in the Brotherhood ceremony.

You must meet five challenges before you can enter the Circle of the Brotherhood. When you are satisfied that you are meeting the first four, then complete the fifth challenge.

1. Memorize the signs of Arrow membership. Memorize the Obligation of the Order, which you received from Allowat Sakima

Brotherhood Certification

(printed on the membership card). Also memorize the Song, the Admonition, the sign of Ordeal membership, and the Arrow handclasp. 2. Advance in your understanding of the Ordeal. Gain a thorough understanding of the Ordeal through which you have passed. 3. Serve your unit. Retain your registration in Scouting. During a period of at least 10 months, strive to fulfill your Obligation by continuing and expanding your service to your own troop. 4. Plan for service in your lodge. Retain your registration in your lodge and keep your dues paid. Be aware that acceptance of Brotherhood membership involves a pledge of service to the lodge. Develop a concrete idea of how you plan to fulfill this pledge. 5. Review your progress. When you earnestly feel that you have met the four challenges above, write a letter to your lodge secretary. In this letter: I, explain what you think the Obligation means; ii, Describe how you have been fulfilling this Obligation in your troop and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the Ordeal to aid in this service; and iii, Describe your specific plans for giving service in the lodge program.
